

Name of the Element: Losar Festival, Ladakh

Community/ies: Tibetans, Bhutanese, Ladakhis, Nepalese, Monpa, and worldwide Tibetan Buddhists

Region: Ladakh

Brief Description: Losar, meaning "New Year" (*Lo* = Year, *Sar* = New), is one of the most significant festivals celebrated in Ladakh. This Tibetan New Year festival lasts for 15 days, with the first three days being the most important. Generally observed between December 8th and 30th, around the winter solstice, Losar holds great historical and cultural significance.

According to legend, King Jamyang Namgyal of Ladakh once received an oracle's advice to delay a battle with the soldiers of Baltistan until the following year. Impatient to commence the fight, the king decided to celebrate the New Year a month early, a tradition that has continued ever since.

Preparations for Losar begin with cleaning and decluttering homes, symbolizing the removal of negativity and the welcoming of prosperity. Houses and monasteries (*gompas*) are adorned with vibrant decorations, and special food preparations are made to share with loved ones and offer to deities. The festivities officially begin on Losar Eve with the *Metho* procession, where people chant sacred slogans and carry flaming torches through streets and markets to ward off evil spirits and negativity. Offerings are made to Buddhist gods and goddesses, particularly Goddess Palden Lhamo, with the Namgyal Monastery leading the ceremonies.

The festival is marked by special prayer ceremonies in monasteries, where monks chant mantras and perform rituals for divine blessings. On the second day, known as "King's Losar," a significant gathering is held in the Hall of Excellence of Nirvana and Samsara, attended by representatives from neighboring regions, including China, Mongolia, Bhutan, and Nepal.

Throughout the festival, Ladakhis participate in community feasts, folk dances, and the mesmerizing *Cham* masked dances. These dances, performed by monks, depict mythical tales and spiritual themes, symbolizing the triumph of good over evil. Another unique aspect of the festival is the reenactment of historical battle scenes, adding an intriguing theatrical element to the celebrations.

Losar is a celebration of love, peace, and unity, aiming to usher in prosperity and harmony for the coming year. The *Metho* procession's flaming torches symbolize the removal of darkness, while the vibrant decorations and colorful masks create a festive ambiance across the region.
